














Blessed To Bless

or anyone who has followed Global Servants for the past several years, you know that Giving Tuesday has become a staple holiday event for us. We look forward to rolling out new initiatives every year with passion to help and serve even more people around the globe. 2022 was our best yet! This year we decided to build upon an initiative that has been at the core of who Global Servants has always been, Education. This year, we decided to mobilize our efforts and take education resources to those who desperately need them but have no way of obtaining them.



In partnership with our teams in Northern Thailand and West Africa, we have successfully purchased and are distributing educational materials to more than 900 children in rural villages. These are children who go to school every day, some walking miles through harsh terrain, with no materials and sit on dirt floors trying gain as much knowledge as possible. It is for these students, these bright young lives, these children that God has given a destiny to that called us into action. From the lives of these beautiful children the village backpack program was birthed.

For \$50, we can resource students in rural villages with: a backpack, water bottle, pencils, chalk, personal slate, books, Bible, and other essential items for effective learning. The pictures you see here are of my last trip to Thailand where I had the pleasure of distributing backpacks in a rural village school just north of Chiang Rai. The children were so happy to receive such a gift that they acted as if it were Christmas morning. For many of them, this was their Christmas present as it was just three days after Christmas. I spoke with a young lady who was in 7th grade.

With tears in her eyes she thanked Global Servants because this was the first backpack and books she had ever owned. This is much more than just a backpack, it is hope and light. For most of these kids this is the biggest investment into their educational future they will ever receive. The backpack

is a symbol of hope and a license to dream.

Due to the overwhelming success of Giving Tuesday, Global Servants has decided to make this initiative a permanent program. After passing out these items, we have seen firsthand the impact this has on these students, teachers, schools, and communities. We are also seeing the local governments rally behind this initiative opening doors for our teams to witness in places that have been closed off to them previously. A team from Restoration Church in Bethlehem, Georgia, joined Ronny













and I as we handed out the first round of backpacks in northern Thailand. I watched as this team felt the joy of blessing young lives and being blessed by the awesome experience of seeing lives changed and empowered right in front of them.

We did surgery on the poorest women I have ever seen in the worst possible conditions. We also stayed in unique accommodations living among the people of Central America. We support Global Servants and sponsor a lovely young lady at House of Grace-Thailand. When the December trip to Thailand was announced, I had to consider my age and possible limitations. Signing up for the journey to Thailand meant long flights, preparation for those long flights, and traveling halfway around the world. I had never been to the Asia, but the thought of visiting another part of the world, seeing the House of Grace, giving a hug to our sponsored child, and letting her know we love her was all I needed to say YES, where do I sign?

This trip was amazing. Not only did we get to see the wonderful House of Grace, stay in very nice accommodations, and eat amazing Thai food but we were able to witness the love, care, nurturing and compassion afforded to each young girl living there. I was able to shop for school supplies for backpacks and distribute them to the schoolchildren of the Akha village, sew buttons on little girls' clothing, and even play board games with a group of giggling girls. In addition, we accomplished our primary goal of setting up a dental office for the next team arriving.

We experienced Thailand's beautiful country in the cities of Chiang Mai, Chiang

Rai, and visited the border of Myanmar (Burma). Visiting the Akha villages in the mountains gave us an authentic view of the hill tribe people of Thailand. Coffee plantations and pineapple fields were abundant. You could see coffee beans drying on the roofs of many homes. We also visited the Elephant Village and did something I never believed I would do, ride an elephant.

Looking back on this amazing trip, I can only say Khob Khun Ka (Thank You) to the wonderful people of Thailand.
