What's next for House of Grace-Thailand?

ne of my favorite aspects of being the president of Global Servants is being able to tell others about all that we are doing. It makes my job so enjoyable and so rewarding. I am proud of all that we have done and are still accomplishing at Global Servants. When I get to share about what Global Servants does around the world, I do not have to embellish our accomplishments. I don't have to try and make the projects seem more impressive than they are. I can honestly and candidly share about all the amazing things that Global Servants

has done over the years. Not because of me or my leadership. I can share with confidence because God has blessed us so wonderfully.

So, having said all that, let me give you an update on the awesome construction project that is happening in As Thailand. you may be aware, we are renovating several

buildings and building a new middle school dormitory at House of Grace Thailand. That construction got underway earlier this year and I am excited to give you an update.

To have housing for our middle girls during the construction of their new dorm, we have created temporary housing for them in the worship space located in the gym. This move also created the need for us to build a dedicated worship/arts area for our girls. I am excited to tell you that this \$85K+ project has already been completed, and our middle girls have moved into their temporary housing. Now, House of Grace Thailand has a first-class worship space complete with new seating, sound, displays, and technology that allows the girls to create skits, dramas, and plays. For years now, it has been a struggle for everyone on campus to be able to fit into the old worship room for church. This new space offers seating for 220 people, providing ample room for the girls to spread out. The demolition of the old dorm begins in November of 2023 and is estimated to be completed by January 2025. With this dorm, we will also be remodeling the dining hall for a greater capacity and building an entirely new commercial kitchen that will provide delicious meals for our girls and staff for years to come.

I look forward to continuing to bring you updates on this ongoing construction project over the next 2 years. This will be a long process but the end will be so wonderful. I cannot wait to share pictures of the

> dedication of the new dormitory. I cannot wait for all of us to see the smiling faces of girls moving into their new home.

The Question Of Legacy

What does it mean to be remembered?

t is inevitable, I suppose, that as we age we begin to think of legacy. We begin to ask ourselves questions such as, have I done anything that was really worthwhile? Will I or anything I have done even be remembered? We often think of legacy in terms of accomplishments, such as a body of work. A director's movies, or an author's books could be considered their legacy. However, that may be more fleeting than many realize. I stopped in a book store recently and found one of my own books in the one dollar barrel! Oh, the humiliation! I can only assume that some poor semi-literate clerk in that store did not understand the inestimable value of one of my books.

One may also have a legacy in brick and mortar. This is a much more enduring strategy. I love to see an individual's name go up on a building. A building might be named for the donor themselves or it could be named for a loved one they want to honor. I always think this is a great idea. The keystone gift for the last campus building I built at a university was given in honor of the donor's grandfather and it was for him that the building was named. It was a beautiful building and a fitting legacy. I think sometimes of all the Carnegie libraries around the world, 3,500 of them. About 1,700 of those libraries are located in the United States. Many, perhaps most, of the folks who use a Carnegie library never think of the Scottish immigrant, Andrew Carnegie, or know how he made his vast fortune. However, his legacy blesses them every time they check out a book. That is a great legacy!

A different kind of legacy is found in the lives of those we touch and whose destinies we inform in ways which may seem less than significant while we are doing them. Every now and then someone comments on our son, Travis', very obvious

anointing in ministry, leadership, and especially in his preaching. Of course, I love to hear it. What parent wouldn't? Then, they will say, "He is your legacy." That is also nice to hear but it is not what I believe. Instead, I think of Alison as a young mother teaching her little boy the Scriptures and helping him memorize lengthy passages. While I was on the road, often out of the country for weeks at a time, those two shared the Word of God. I believe those formative moments shaped him as a man and as a preacher more than anything I did. When I watch Travis preach his wonderful sermons and see how he leads his church and Global Servants, I see his mother's fingerprints, not mine.

My own mother went to be with the Lord in September. I miss her and our daily phone calls. Wherever I was, I would call her and tell about the town I was visiting or the scenery or the weather and, of course, about whatever ministry event I was there for. She loved to hear it all. I always say my mother lived her life out loud. She was born in poverty and started picking cotton in blazing East Texas cottons field when she was barely able to drag the sack. She was a ninth-grade dropout who read her way into a wonderful education and did more than any college professor I ever had to truly educate me. At her memorial service a lady told me, "Your mother saved my life. In the darkest moment of my life her voice on the phone became my life line." I never knew that. My mom was a handful! She took nothing from nobody but her heart was soft for folks in need. That is a great legacy!

Recently, I learned something new about legacy and it touched my heart. A man who never even told me his name came up to me after a service where I preached. He said, "You'll never know what you have meant to me. I got saved in my thirties but alcohol had a terrible grip on me. I needed a



friend, an everyday friend to speak truth and life into my soul. You became that friend." "Do I know you?" I asked him. "We've never met in person but your radio program got me through to sobriety and deliverance. I'm now 30 years sober and it began with your radio program. Every day I would sit in my car and eat my lunch and listen to your program. I can never thank you enough!"

That was certainly wonderful to hear but more than that, it reminded me of something in my own life. I received the baptism of the Holy Spirit as a 28-yearold Methodist preacher. I needed, deeply

needed, a voice of encouragement. I needed teaching. I needed to hear Spiritfilled preaching and above all things, I needed faith. Every day I would sit in my car and listen to the late R. W. Shambach on the radio. I devoured his preaching, but what I loved, what I waited for every day, was his sign off line. I can still hear him say it. "YOU DON'T HAVE ANY PROBLEMS, FRIEND. ALL YOU NEED IS FAITH IN GOD." I could feel his faith come out of that radio and enter me. I knew I could make it. I knew I had faith in God and I knew God would see me through. I don't know all that those

two stories mean, but I know they say something, something important, about the question of legacy.

Big Destinies Become Realities

Unlocking the future with vocational, entrepreneurial, and agricultural skills

The result is impressive when God's people work together to accomplish a unified goal! Saving Little Girls for Big Destinies has been the ambition of Global Servants at House of Grace Thailand for over thirty-five years. Over the years,

many churches and individuals have agreed with this goal and provided the resources to make this a reality for hundreds of girls.

The girls at both homes can attend any school of higher learning they can get into. We have girls in several universities, nursing schools, teacher colleges, and vocational colleges. In the past five years, there has been an emphasis at both homes to increase vocational opportunities and entrepreneurial inspiration.

On a recent sponsor trip to House of Grace-Thailand, we delivered over 300 pounds of material, sewing accessories,

embroidery thread, yarn, knitting needles, crochet hooks, and the list continues. Sunday school classes from Trinity Church at Marble Hill, Hickory Ridge Community Church, and Buford Church of God blessed the home more than you

could imagine. Once on campus, we



purchased five new storage cabinets to hold all the supplies.

Yarn art, knitting, and crocheting are heirloom activities that many of us learned from our grandmothers. Crocheted headbands and purses are trendy. We saw several booths with handmade items

> at the night market. This skill will be something the girls could use to make items to sell. When the girls are on holiday from school, they can make and sell traditional Akha stitchery online at platforms such as Etsy. According to the Business of Apps over 95 million people are active buyers on Etsy, and it has 7.3 million sellers. The skills they learn at House of Grace-Thailand help support their family. In our sewing lab, the girls are learning to turn their beautiful hand embroidery into items like clothes, book covers, wallets, purses, and handbags.



Another project at House of Grace-Thailand is the new kitchen garden. What started as a small memorial by a loving friend quickly became an agricultural adventure. The land on the back of the property beside the chicken coop was



the perfect place. After the purchase of a garden tiller/cultivator, there were lots of girls interested in helping. Gardening without digging every inch with a spade made farming exciting and not just backbreaking. As we cleared the land for the garden, the burn pile became larger and larger. After much discussion about the environmental impact of burning and where to pile stuff until the burning season, a chipper/shredder became the solution.

Working in the yard became very popular with the introduction of labor-reducing tools. Growing food for the campus started many conversations about what everyone likes—the nutritional



value of certain foods and the cultural significance of others. The girls talked about foods grown worldwide, like peanuts, pineapple, and those specific to Thailand, like durians. According to The World Bank - World Development Indicators in 2021, Thailand reported that 31% of their national employment is in agriculture. Many of the girls' parents are day laborers or field workers bringing in a harvest for minimal pay. Most of the girls and even some staff had not seen a tiller or a chipper/shredder. Our prayer is the kitchen garden will inspire girls to consider agriculture as a profession. Not a day laborer but agriculture equipment technician, purchasing agent, agricultural specialist, crop manager, environmental engineer, administrative professional, or even a research scientist.

Only the future will tell how God uses the experiences at House of Grace-Thailand to shape the lives of these girls. Big Destinies become realities because of your prayers and financial support.

gathering of alumnae from House of Grace Thailand Abecame a private memorial for Mrs. Rosemary Rutland. The Church at Liberty Square's Celebration of Life program was read aloud and translated into Thai. There were tears of joy and appreciation among the women in attendance. Everyone there knew her as "Grandma," and all had a personal story about how they met and how she changed their lives. They spoke of how Grandma introduced them to a loving Savior and how their entire family's legacy was altered. These women came from hill tribe villages where growing opium, selling drugs, and using young girls for commerce was normal. They spoke of education, family, and personal prosperity, giving credit to Grandma and coming to House of Grace.

The evolution of some families in the hill tribe villages is impressive and this day was a perfect example. We gathered at Lawmi Coffee & Fish Park owned by a House of Grace alumna, Pornsuda, and her husband. They own equipment used to sort, package, and distribute coffee worldwide and purchased exclusively from hill tribe farmers. Lawmi carries the King's Coffee, a government project started by H.M. King Bhumibhol Adulyadej Rama IX, to encourage hill tribes to grow coffee instead of opium. Doi Chiang, one village where several of these women are from, is now known for its excellent coffee, not the drug trade and trafficking of young girls. Lawmi is a thriving enterprise that trains older girls from the House of Grace in food service and business management. The work experience is valuable. However, seeing someone like you being financially successful gives hope and inspiration to many girls.

Before I know it, we have arrived, and a slew of little girls take turns hugging my waist before running off to start their day.


> leave happier, even if it is through the blurred vision of happy tears when we promise to meet again.



o most people in America and other first-world countries, a backpack with school supplies is a common item of modest value. But in the rural villages of Ghana & Thailand, this item possesses incredible wealth that can open doors in a child's destiny that they had not dreamed possible. In 2022, Global Servants launched an education initiative to empower children in rural villages of Thailand and Ghana by investing in their futures with backpacks filled with school supplies, hygiene items, and health supplements. Because of your generosity and willingness to invest

learn to read, feeding both their minds and souls.

I can not adequately describe the feeling of excitement while visiting these schools. The first schools to receive their supplies were students in northern Thailand in December of 2022. Most



of these kids had not received anything for Christmas until Global Servants showed up. This was made possible by the fantastic team of people from Restoration Church in Bethlehem, Georgia, who gave up their holidays to go and serve others. The children laughed, jumped, and

There was a sea of Global Servants backpacks filling the dirt paths as children raced home to tell others about what happened at school that day.

hroughout the changing scenes of life, our God in His own wisdom connect us to individuals who come into our lives to ensure that the purpose of God for our lives do come

It is against this background that I write on the trip embarked to the three Northern Regions of Ghana, namely Northern, North East and Upper West and some parts of Brong Ahafo Region, where there is Global Servants Church.

One of such incidents was when backpacks were presented to a woman and her children who were just returning from the farm and you could tell from their faces and expression about how thankful they were for the gift.

The packs were not limited to the Christian communities alone but were further extended to the non-Christian community. This gesture preached to the recipient and made them know that the love of Christ was not only limited to Christian's but to the world at large.

SOCIAL INTERVENTION PROGRAM

There is a new governmental policy for the running of orphanage homes which encourages homes to come up with social intervention programs such as reaching out to the community, educating individuals in the community and attempting to address prevailing human issues in such areas. The outreach that was embarked in the three northern regions do satisfy this condition proposed under this policy. The assumption is that, not all the poor and vulnerable children would get the opportunity with an admission to a home.

This widow's mite would go a long way to give the less privileged hope about the future and help them positively anticipate for the best. This is a life changing program and an assurance that there are no barriers to how God can send help. A typical Bible reference is attributed to how Elijah was used to sustain the widow of Zarephath and same has been replicated by Global Servants.

With a grateful heart, we say Ayekoo (well done) to Global Servants, to our esteemed staff and our cherished sponsors. Thanks so much and God richly bless you.
