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## A Touch Of Jesus

From Acts to action - Jesus' touch resonates across continents

rederick II served as the Holy Roman Emperor in the early 1200's. In addition to being the emperor, he saw himself as a scientist. One experiment that he conducted was an attempt to prove what was the original language of humanity. Specifically, if no language was ever spoken to a baby, what language would they speak? There were many speculations. One idea was that a baby's language would be the native language of the parents. That language was somehow passed down like eye color. Others thought it might be Latin or possibly Hebrew. So, Frederick II located a number of abandoned newborns and gave them into the care of nurses with strict instructions on how to raise them. The nurses were ordered not to interact with the children other than when strictly necessary. The infants could be fed and bathed but no more. They were not to be spoken to or coold over - under any circumstances. Frederick II never got an answer to the question of the original language of the babies. All of the babies, starved of any form of affection, warmth, and basic interaction died from a lack of touch.

Jesus, in His ministry, often interacted through touch. In Mark 1:40-42, a man holds out his leprous hand to Jesus and asks for healing. The man tells Jesus that he knows Jesus can heal him if He is willing. Jesus responds by saying, "I am willing!" and He touches the man's hand and the man is healed. This is the wonderful thing about Jesus. Jesus is willing to heal us. Jesus is willing to extend His hand of healing no matter what we have done, the sin we have committed or the pain that we have caused. Our hands are diseased and sinful. We destroy our lives and our future and yet Jesus still says, "I am willing!"

Throughout His ministry, people were desperate to get close to Jesus. Why? It was more than the fact that it was a willing touch. It was that His touch was powerful. The crowds were desperate to touch Jesus because in His touch was power. His touch transforms people. They are healed, delivered, redeemed, and restored through His touch. Jesus is the son of God and in Him we find transformation. We are no longer in bondage because not only is Jesus willing to heal but He actually can. The touch of Jesus



heals us physically, emotionally, and spiritually. His touch on our life restores us completely.

Finally, the most important aspect of the touch of Jesus is as an example for us. In Acts 3, Peter and John heal the lame man on their way into the temple. In Acts 3:7, it tells us that Peter touched the man and he was healed. This is the model for us. The touch of Jesus must be replicated. The call is for us to replicate what Jesus did. The power and healing in His touch must also be active in our lives. The early church continued the ministry of Jesus by laying hands on others. Now, we are the hands of Jesus. Hands touch.

That is their entire job. We must help others and do all that we can to touch the lives of people around us.

Replicating the touch of Jesus remains the goal of Global Servants in both West Africa and Thailand. The girl in danger of human trafficking is given a future because of the touch of Jesus. The village with no access to clean water that is given the gift of a well receives the touch of Jesus. However, this is not just a Global Servants calling. I encourage you to make it your purpose too. The world around us is dying from a lack of touch and we can all be the hands of Jesus. There are people in your life that need

to experience the touch of Jesus and you can replicate it. Together we can be the hands of Jesus around the world! ◀

Religious symbols, memories, and a prayer for peace

gainst the wall in our dining room is a curio cabinet inhabited by artifacts brought home from the travels of our lifetime. Alison has that rare decorator's touch to arrange such little treasures in a way that they display perfectly. They are beautiful and we love to show them off to visitors and tell them where each came from. The majority are from Israel, the country we love and love to visit. Among them are an intricately engraved tik, a Torah case, some gorgeous olive wood carvings and several pieces of beautiful silver statuary. They are not priceless but they are also not knick-knacks. They are lovely works of art that are especially precious to us because they speak of memories, of people we love, and of the country we pray for, Israel.

In addition to those treasures, at our front door, attached to the jam, head high on the right is a particularly eye-catching mezuzah which was also a gift from a friend in Israel. I do not think of him nor of Israel every time I see it, but it does remind me more often than if it were not there.

Alison and I are friends of Israel, this is no secret. Several years ago, I was given the Defender Of Israel Award by the Christians' Israel Public Action Campaign (CIPAC). To this day it is one of my most treasured honors. I also love my own country. I am a patriot and a Zionist. Yet, I know that neither country is perfect. The United States has done stupid and even sinful things and we have way too often elected reprehensible people to the highest offices in the land. Being a patriot is not the same thing as living in historical denial. Likewise, being a lover and defender of Israel does not imply thinking Israel and its leaders are perfect. They are not. I readily admit that if it needs admitting at all.

On the other hand, they are not genocidal oppressors! Israel is like a nice, decent family living in a really beautiful home in a terrible, frightening and dangerous neighborhood. Such a family is beyond naive if they do not arm and defend themselves against neighbors who have sworn publicly to destroy them and burn down their house. Israel is a democratic state, and the best ally of the USA. They are an ally which shares with us an ethos that derives from the Bible.

If terrorists in pickup trucks were to cross the Rio Grande on a mission of slaughter, rape, murder, torture and kidnapping innocent civilians, then one would expect that the United States would answer with a crushing military response that would wipe out those guerrillas and destroy their bases of operation. What Hamas did on October 7, 2023, was not a legitimate military action by soldiers against soldiers. It was not the resistance of an oppressed minority. It was a monstrous criminal attack by animalistic murderers who committed unspeakable atrocities against civilians including the elderly, women, children and infants. It was an indefensible nightmare which no thinking human being with even a shred of a soul can justify or rationalize by pointing the finger at Israel and screaming, "Yeah but look what they did!" Such a false equivalency is wicked and will only serve to encourage murderers, such as Hamas.

Here is the bottom line question. Demand an answer from anyone who cares to cast Israel as the occupier/aggressor. If every surrounding nation and every Islamic army, including Iran, laid down their arms tomorrow, what would Israel do? Would they march in and slaughter those nations? You know they would not. On the other hand, if Israel disarmed what would happen? You also



know the answer to that. In days, if not hours, every Jew from the river to the sea would be murdered.

Finally, I will say this about the idiotic protests against Israel on campuses and elsewhere. Hidden beneath, and not very well hidden at that, is not outrage at Israeli political and military policies. The driving force, regardless of any effort to deny, is anti-Semitism. The most ancient and mysterious of all hates is the hatred of Jews. It is Satanic and as in all things Satanic, regardless of where it begins, it always ends with murder. Whether it is rape and murder in a peaceful village

in Southern Israel or a gas oven in Auschwitz, there is no difference. There is no defense. There is no justification. There is no equivalency. Israel is not perfect. It is absurd to claim it is. Indeed, Israel makes no claim of perfection. Israel only claims for itself the right to exist and to defend that right with all its might.

This evening at the Wednesday night service at my son's beautiful church, I will not be afraid that a bomb will kill and maim the attendees. I will return to my lovely home in peace. I will not be afraid of who might be lurking in the bushes or who might attack in the night.

But as I come in the door, I will touch the mezuzah and pray for my friends in Israel and for the peace of Jerusalem. ◀

## **Harmonizing Hearts and Homes**

The powerful intersection of cultural heritage, faith and destiny

eunification is about hope for many girls in villages. Reunification is a word we often hear with governments, divided territories, or political parties. There is additional meaning to reunification when it comes to children. According to ONETrack International, "Reunification is the process in which orphaned or abandoned children are reintroduced into a home of family members in their community of origin."

If reunification means you must be reacquainted with your community of origin, this does not apply to the girls at House of Grace-Thailand or House of Grace-Ghana. The girls at House of Grace do not need to be reunited with their culture because they have never left it. They have physically left their village to live in Kumasi or Chiang Rai but have not left their culture.

Both homes maintain ties to the villages of origin for all the girls at House of Grace. Financial support provided through Global Servants has built wells for entire villages and sanitation stations in villages in Northern Ghana where the

girls' families reside. We have supported schools with educational materials for students and teachers in Gbimsi, Kukua, and Nayoko, Ghana, where four of our older girls are from. In the aftermath of flash flooding, supplies, food, and materials have been provided to San Kret Thong, Chiang Rai, Thailand.



There is concern over the safety of girls returning to a place of physical danger that required rescuing and removal of the child. In Thailand, the girls with a safe place to visit go to their villages on school holidays. Some will stay at an aunt or grandmother's home for their school break. Some girls do not have a safe place and remain on campus. Visiting their home village has also become a practice at House of Grace-Ghana in recent years. The older girls have stayed in their villages after completing ninth and twelfth grades while awaiting their subsequent school placement. Recently, the older girls are spending school breaks in their villages with family members.

In Ghana, the girls have been away from their families for ten years. The circumstances that brought them to House of Grace have drastically changed. Their brothers and sisters, who were also orphaned, are now in their twenties and have their own families. They have homes and can offer shelter to their sister. When the girls visit, they bring a stipend for living expenses





that their sponsor family has provided through Global Servants. The hosting household benefits from the increase in groceries and the nutritional education the girls have received at the House of Grace. While in the villages, girls from both homes help with family chores, assist the younger children with school work, and help in church activities. The girls bring the children books, candy, prizes, and games.

This year, four of our Ghanaian girls commissioned seamstresses from their villages to make their Kente dresses for Christmas. Dan Odarno, our West Africa National Director, says, "The charge from making one dress can purchase a 5kg bag of rice." If a serving

is 100g or half a cup of rice, it is 50 servings. A seamstress making one dress in the village can provide 50 meals for her family. There are many more examples of the economic impact that



our House of Grace girls visiting their families can have.

There is an argument that reunification enforces the systematic class system operating in povertydriven villages by taking children from a thriving environment into a place of desolation to keep them poor and uneducated. The drive from both homes to their villages in the north is not just distance, but as if you have traveled in a time machine. These girls may return to village homes with dirt floors, no running water, and schools

without books. At House of Grace, they have a room with a bed, wardrobe, tiled floors, flushable toilets, private showers, and they attend schools with advanced educational resources. However, the light of Jesus shines through these girls. Their environment does not dictate their hopes and dreams.

Just as Joseph said in Genesis 50:20, "But as for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good." Being in their villages of origin does not defeat or make them feel their future is limited. No! These girls know God has saved them for a big destiny. They shine light on every place they visit and give hope to the children around them. From the clothes the girls wear, to the languages they speak, and how they carry themselves with purpose and authority - radiating joy from their hearts with smiling faces - these girls are living witnesses of God's love.

According to Sandra Odarno, the most essential aspect of the reunification process is the evidence of hope. If God can do this for an orphaned girl without options, He can do it for me.

Indeed, Juliana has brought smiles on the faces of all and sundry. She is now a role model to all her House of Grace siblings who are also aspiring to enter university. Gaining a university admission is a dream come true. Juliana is now a happy girl. Grace has found her, and we really thank and appreciate what God has done in her life. ## **Clean Water, Where Opportunities Flow**

From distant rivers to local wells: How Global Servants empowers communities

would say there is one thing that most of us living in first-world countries take for granted more than anything else: the ability to access clean water daily. Water affects so much of our daily lives. Water affects how we drink, how we bathe, our healthcare, and so many other essential parts of life. When Global Servants puts a well into a rural village, we aren't just giving easy access to water. We open that community up to the possibilities of a better life.

When clean water is available for people in the rural villages we serve, we see an instant impact on the improvement of their community. Clean water means personal hygiene, and washing clothes and other linens is possible. This helps to cut down on communal diseases that are easily transmitted. We can also see a direct impact of healthcare within the community. Having clean water to drink allows for proper hydration without the threat of contracting a virus that could cause harm or even, in some cases, death. I would say my

favorite impact to witness is how clean water transforms the educational possibilities within the community.

On one of my recent trips to Ghana, I had the honor of visiting the community of Gbimsi. In this area, the nearest water source was several miles away. We were standing in front of a school started by one of our Trinity Foundation pastors, and they had no access to clean water. The pastor explained that they would take all the children to the river, several miles away, during the dry months so they could have school on the riverbanks. This was the only safe way to have the children do school so they would not dehydrate, but because it is a public river, there is still a threat of communal disease due to



contamination. The lack of clean water at the school building also meant that girls on their cycle couldn't attend classes until their cycle ended. This



suggests that young ladies received fewer educational opportunities than young men because they had nowhere to take care of themselves appropriately. This is where Global Servants stepped in.

Because of faithful worldwide, Global Servants was able to sink a deep well, giving access to clean water for decades to come, and built sanitation stations for the students and teachers to relieve themselves in a dignified and sanitary way. This gave proper, safe hydration to all the students and paved the way for educational equality for all students. Clean water is more than just fluid; it can bring life and opportunity. Clean water is an essential item that every human should have access to. The impact of clean water is immediate and has the power to change whole communities for generations.
